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
Heritage Happenings for July 2010

Napier District historic Records

Ernie Start is the Service Centre Manager for Transfield Services in Napier and unfortunately the Napier group has now closed its operations.

The Napier Group has had a long history and contributed a large part in the building of the electricity network on the East Coast from Tokomaru to Masterton and their heritage goes back to the early days when the group was a district of its own.

Ernie is currently finalizing the archiving of the records but when he became Manager 20 years ago he preserved the old district records and he has some that go back to 1925 including early photos of many substations. The collection includes the old hand written account registers, building files etc. Also included are some photos of retirements and staff photos around the 1950/60s.

We are hoping to get hold of this collection in the near future and this will be another massive digitising exercise.

Alstom Users Group Conference

In September Transpower is hosting an Alstom Australasian Users Group Conference in Wellington. So what does this mean to GridHeritage I hear you ask? This was originally the ESCA

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Users Group that has been involved in the development of SCADA and market systems for many years. This technology has played a central part in the efficient centralised operation of the New Zealand power system. Transpower staff have been involved in the development and maintenance of the software, and in the setting up of the original ESCA organisation in Seattle. This conference is an opportunity for GridHeritage to collect and document the history of the 15 year Transpower/ ESCA relationship.

Research into this subject has also reopened the need to document the hardware used in early Transpower computer systems.
